
A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAMBER SAN MATEO COUNTY PRESIDENT & CEO

Please provide a brief biography/summary of qualifications.

I am Anna Cheng Kramer, a dedicated Housing Policy Executive and Businesswoman with deep roots in the Bay Area Peninsula since 1976. As an immigrant from Taiwan, I became a U.S. citizen out of love for America's freedoms and opportunities. My career began in the commercial real estate sector, where I eventually specialized in housing. I hold an MBA from the University of Santa Clara and have successfully managed housing units across the West Coast and nationwide. I have also served as Chief Operating Officer of a nonprofit, Mid-Peninsula Housing Coalition, gaining extensive experience in safe, affordable housing finance, construction, and occupancy. My public service includes chairing North Fair Oaks and serving on the Economic Development Advisory Commission in San Carlos. I am running for U.S. Congress to address housing, public safety, and economic issues with local solutions, emphasizing bipartisan cooperation and effective government spending to reflect the will of the people

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

My economic development vision for San Mateo County focuses on fostering a thriving, resilient economy driven by innovation and sustainability. I will prioritize infrastructure improvement, supporting small businesses, and building safe, affordable housing as pillars of economic growth. To ensure policies reflect the needs of the community, I will actively engage with Chamber members and other stakeholders through regular consultations, town halls, and advisory committees. By listening to the voices of local business leaders and residents, we can create a collaborative environment where businesses flourish and contribute to the overall prosperity of our area.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

As an elected official, I will prioritize open communication, respect, and collaboration with my colleagues to foster strong relationships. I believe in the power of consensus-building, where diverse perspectives are valued, and common ground is sought. By focusing on shared goals and maintaining a commitment to transparency, I will work diligently to bridge differences and develop policies that benefit our entire community. My approach will be rooted in active listening and a willingness to compromise, ensuring that we create solutions that are both effective and widely supported.

What are your top two policy priorities? What do you hope will be the impact of implementing these policies?

My top two policy priorities are public safety and the economy. For public safety, I will work to enhance local law enforcement capabilities while fostering community-based initiatives that build trust and collaboration between residents and police. We must provide sufficient training and recourses for law enforcement to do their job. To ensure a thriving economy, I will encourage the elimination of bureaucratic regulations and elimination or reduction of fees that stymie business growth to stimulate the economy. The impact of these policies will be a more secure, inclusive, and vibrant community where everyone can thrive.

How do you plan to address regulatory challenges facing local businesses? What specific policies would you sponsor to streamline business regulations?

To address regulatory challenges facing local businesses, I will advocate for streamlining processes to reduce unnecessary bureaucratic hurdles. I plan to sponsor policies that simplify permitting, reduce redundant regulations, and promote transparency in regulatory requirements. By creating a more business-friendly environment, we can encourage entrepreneurship, attract investment, and support the growth of small businesses, which are the backbone of our local economy. My approach will involve close collaboration with business owners, local government, and industry experts to identify specific areas where reforms are needed most.

Please provide a brief biography/summary of qualifications.

I was honored to be first elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 2022 after representing San Mateo County in the State Assembly for 10 years and previously as a Mayor/Councilmember and small business owner in South San Francisco. As the #2 officer in the Assembly, I was part of the leadership team and presided regularly over floor sessions. In this role, I made rulings on parliamentary inquiries and helped ensure bi-partisan cooperation and civility during Assembly business. In the California Assembly, I authored more than 60 bills that were signed into law including landmark legislation pioneering all vote-by-mail elections and combating dark money in state campaigns. Expanding access to the ballot box and strengthening our democracy was one of the top priorities in the Assembly. I championed for climate resiliency as one of the architects of the \$3.7 billion climate resilience package that helped ensure funding was allocated for Caltrain electrification, and worked to ensure the creation of San Mateo County's OneShoreline, the agency that will help fight sea level rise and work to protect local, state, and federal assets and infrastructure.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

I believe strongly that we need to have an economy that works for all. California has historically given more money to the federal government than we receive back in federal support. The San Francisco Bay Area is an economic engine for our nation. I will continue to work with the Chamber of Commerce to create bipartisan solutions that support economic growth, job creation, and business advancement. It is important to work with local government officials, industry leaders, and the Chamber of Commerce to promote partnerships and collaboration. Seniors, working families, and low-income communities in California's 15th Congressional District should not have to struggle to afford basic needs. I am focused on reducing the cost of living for hard-working Californians. I support a progressive, equitable tax code that keeps costs down for working families while ensuring that large corporations and the wealthiest 1% pay their fair share.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

While in the State Assembly, I built relationships across the aisle. In Congress, there are ways to work together. Despite rising polarization in Congress, legislative effectiveness is heightened when members build bipartisan coalitions around the bills they sponsor. Reciprocal relationships are key to increasing bipartisan support and legislative effectiveness. Members of Congress should be willing to support well-thought-out proposals across party lines and in turn receive bipartisan support for their best policy solutions.

What are your top two policy priorities? What do you hope will be the impact of implementing these policies?

In Congress, I have continued to defend our democracy from those who ignore the will of the people and the rule of law. I am a leader on the Task Force on Strengthening Democracy and have pushed for the passage of H.R.11: the Freedom to Vote Act. I pledge to work in a bipartisan way to rebuild public trust in Congress and ensure we have a democracy that delivers on our biggest challenges. I serve on the House Natural Resources Committee and the Science, Space, and Technology Committee. I will ensure the country follows California's lead to fight climate change and electrify public transit as CalTrain plans to do in its modernization plan. I have introduced the Weatherization Resilience and Adaptation Program (WRAP) Act to assist low-income homeowners and affordable housing providers in making their properties more resilient to climate change. I have supported legislation tackling gun violence and protecting reproductive freedoms and brought in over \$14 million in federal funding for community projects to improve flood controls, bikeways, roads, and trails and am advocating for an additional \$13 million. Additionally, I authored the Poverty Line Act to modernize the federal poverty formula to include housing, child care, and health care costs so that we may build an economy that works for all.

How do you plan to address regulatory challenges facing local businesses? What specific policies would you sponsor to streamline business regulations?

As the founder and previous owner of a small business, I know the challenges facing entrepreneurs. Small businesses are the backbone of our country. Small businesses make up 99% of all businesses yet receive about one-quarter of federal government contracts. Despite government goals of awarding contracts to small businesses, the \$500 billion federal marketplace remains largely closed. I believe that Congress must come together and work to provide critical financial support to small businesses by opening the federal contracting system and increasing access to capital to help increase new opportunities, cultivate existing businesses, and enhance our economy. I want to level the playing field, making sure everyone has a fair shot at being awarded a federal contract.

Please provide a brief biography/summary of qualifications.

I have served as Mayor of San José (2015–2023) and on the San José City Council (2007–2015). As Mayor, I took a pragmatic approach to tackling tough issues. We found innovative solutions for affordable housing and homelessness, rebuilt our police department, reduced City debt by \$3 billion, protected hillsides and open space, decarbonized our grid, and engaged proactively with the tech community. In my final year, I left my successor with a \$30 million surplus, reduced street homelessness by 11%, and recorded the lowest homicide rate among major U.S. cities. I collaborated with Supervisor David Pine on Measure RR to expand and electrify Caltrain service, and with other regional officials on Measure AA to restore our wetlands. I have served as a board member of the Association of Bay Area Governments and the Metropolitan Transportation Commission. I am endorsed by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the National Association of Realtors, and four San Mateo County supervisors, including Jackie Speier. Prior to elected office, I served as a prosecutor in the Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office and the Southern District of California. I am a graduate of Harvard Law School, Harvard's School of Government, and Georgetown University.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

In Congress, I will work to reduce the costs of living and doing business, which needlessly stifle our innovative region. At SamLiccardo.com/plan, I advocate restoring R&D expenditures for small companies and increasing high-skilled immigration for our employers who need more talent. Through creatively expanding our housing supply, we can allow our companies to hire and retain a strong workforce. I also propose a federally-backed financing program for energy-efficient utilities and risk-reducing retrofits, which will empower small businesses to reduce their burdensome utility bills and insurance premiums. I have learned much from community members and relevant stakeholders on the campaign trail by starting every conversation with a question—the same way I intend to govern.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

I will bring a results-oriented approach to Congress, reaching across the aisle to tackle our region's pressing challenges like homelessness, crime, and the cost of living. I will join the Congressional Problem Solvers Caucus, which requires each new member to recruit a member of the opposing party upon joining. I look forward to working with the Caucus to exchange ideas, find common ground, and advance common-sense solutions to critical national issues. From my first day as Mayor, I worked to build consensus amid pension reform battles that had left San José City Hall with 1,000 fewer employees. I spent the next year negotiating a reform measure with 11 city unions, ultimately saving taxpayers \$3 billion over 25 years, while restoring services and City staff.

What are your top two policy priorities? What do you hope will be the impact of implementing these policies?

Reducing the punishing cost of living. At SamLiccardo.com/plan, I propose creating a financing program for energy-efficient utilities and retrofits to reduce utility bills and insurance premiums; eliminating agricultural subsidies and tariffs to cut grocery costs; and promoting transparency and competition in prescription drug pricing, among other ideas. These policies will enable our residents to live comfortably and our businesses to attract workers, helping our regional economy thrive. Addressing our affordable housing and homelessness crises. At SamLiccardo.com/plan, I propose providing tax credits to convert underutilized commercial buildings into multifamily housing, creating a federal financing program for backyard homes, supporting the quick-build housing industry, and investing in homelessness prevention. These policies will support our rent-burdened residents while helping the unhoused enter dignified shelter.

How do you plan to address regulatory challenges facing local businesses? What specific policies would you sponsor to streamline business regulations?

In my policy agenda at SamLiccardo.com/plan, I acknowledge that California is overburdened with regulatory constraints that hamper our local businesses. I advocate using federal tax credits and funding as a lever to cut through red tape. For example, I propose a tax credit to help finance the costly conversion of vacant commercial buildings to housing. Congress could condition these dollars on the city and state's commitment to streamline approvals, allow by-right zoning changes in downtowns, waive or reduce local fees, and exempt the projects from onerous environmental review. In doing so, we will improve the climate, create jobs, reduce crime, and revitalize our downtown areas, while building housing quickly and at a lower cost.

Please provide a brief biography/summary of qualifications.

Elected as the youngest Asian American and LGBT mayor in the country, Evan Low entered public service to champion the middle class. During his ten years as an Assemblymember, he was named California's most effective lawmaker, delivering more signed bills than any other member. He helped secure over \$40 billion to build more affordable housing, increase funding for public schools, provide free community college, and support families struggling with the cost of living. When reproductive rights were under assault, he co-authored legislation to enshrine reproductive freedom in the California Constitution. Evan's commitment to safety is personal. As the proud brother of a police officer serving this district, he led the charge to increase law enforcement funding and keep guns out of the hands of criminals and people with mental illness. He was named "Legislator of the Year" by the California Police Chiefs Association. Evan will hold oil companies accountable and fight against pharmaceutical companies' price gouging. He is committed to making our region more affordable for middle and working-class families. Evan is the only candidate in this race endorsed by the California Democratic Party, labor unions, firefighters, police, nurses, and teachers, and he holds a 100% score from Planned Parenthood.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

I believe the federal government needs to do more to help uplift low-income communities in the district while offering more resources and support for businesses of all levels to thrive. As my father was President of the Campbell Chamber of Commerce and deeply involved in the community, I grew up seeing the critical role Chambers of Commerce have in fostering vitality in our community. If elected, I will continue working with chamber members and community leaders to build consensus on creating targeted policies.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

In my work on Campbell City Council and the State Assembly, I have a proven track record of reaching across the aisle to pass bipartisan legislation. The key to success in working in Congress and supporting our local business community is through coalition building. As co-founder of the California Technology & Innovation Legislative Caucus, I have built productive working relationships with fellow legislative colleagues, business owners, and workers to understand the unique challenges we face in our area. Transportation, housing, and our economic environment depend on regional collaboration and fostering dialogue to identify effective and balanced policy solutions.

What are your top two policy priorities? What do you hope will be the impact of implementing these policies?

My top priorities in Congress would be tackling the high costs of living and public safety, which significantly impact businesses' ability to hire and retain experienced staff and foster a safe environment for businesses and customers, respectively. Especially in our district, the high costs of living has exacerbated by COVID, and I have heard from many small businesses about how they still have not been able to fully recover. The federal government must continue investing in small businesses, by eliminating regulatory red tape that is costly while providing more tax deductions for startup costs. If elected to Congress, I will work on the federal level to support law enforcement while also delivering common sense criminal justice reform to minimize violent crime.

How do you plan to address regulatory challenges facing local businesses? What specific policies would you sponsor to streamline business regulations?

Serial ADA lawsuits have affected our region and has forced many small businesses to shut down because they cannot afford the legal costs of a lawsuit. I want to work with small business owners, disability advocates, and state and federal partners to help streamline business regulation that offers more time and financial support for businesses who are working in good faith to have their business become ADA compliant. According to California, businesses in non-English speaking neighborhoods or non-franchise businesses are disproportionally targeted, which is a stark illustration of how Congress needs to help provide more education and resources to help uplift all types of businesses.

Please provide a brief biography/summary of qualifications.

I was first elected to the California State Assembly in November 2022 to represent the 21st Assembly District, which includes the entire Bayside of San Mateo County. In the Assembly, I serve as Chair of the Assembly Committee on Water, Parks & Wildlife and on the Committees on Transportation and Governmental Organization & Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials. Previously, I served as mayor and city councilmember for the City of San Mateo where I championed investment in infrastructure, transit and climate adaptation among many policy pursuits. In the State Assembly, I am focused on investing in strategies to address climate change and the related challenges of flooding, drought, and wildfires, as well as water quality, women's health, accessible and quality healthcare services, gun safety, affordable housing, and access to quality public schools. I hold a B.A. in political science from the University of California, Los Angeles and a J.D. from the University of California Law (formerly Hastings). Professionally, my experience includes working as an attorney in several different firms, including my own private practice representing small businesses. I also work as an executive director of the nonprofit John's Closet in Daly City, providing new clothing to children in need.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

San Mateo County is fortunate to have a dynamic business environment with small businesses and global brands alike. Throughout my time in office, I have regularly worked with our business community directly or in concert with local and regional organizations. While in the State Assembly, I have had the opportunity to engage on many fronts both in Sacramento and locally. This includes events, tours, supporting state or federal grants, resolving issues with state bureaucracies and carrying legislation to provide greater opportunity to conduct business in California. Our state and local businesses provide jobs, support public services and are critical to our region's economic success. I will continue to engage and work to support the needs of California and San Mateo County businesses.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

As part of an 80-member body, I continue to engage and build both personal and professional relationships with my colleagues and all stakeholders. Knowing and understanding the needs and philosophies of all stakeholders is incredibly important to advance public policy. I was fortunate in my first term to be appointed Assistant Majority Leader which allowed me to engage regularly with my colleagues as part of Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas' leadership team. Subsequently, I was appointed as chair of the Assembly Committee on Water, Parks and Wildlife where I have had the opportunity to work with a variety of colleagues and stakeholders on a broad spectrum of issues including helping to shape the \$10 billion climate resiliency bond on the November General Election Ballot now known as Proposition 4. Collegiality, listening carefully and an openness to compromise have served me well in my first term and I look forward to the opportunity to another term to advance legislation that meets the needs of my constituents and those of all California residents.

What are your top two policy priorities? What do you hope will be the impact of implementing these policies?

Building on my work as a local elected official in San Mateo County, I knew that climate resilience will continue to be a significant focus. San Mateo County is the most at-risk county in California to the threat of sea level rise with two coasts, hundreds of thousands of residents and billions of dollars in assets exposed. That is why I co-authored legislation to place Proposition 4 on the state ballot and embed within it opportunities for our county and cities to compete for dollars to support projects that will protect our communities from a variety of climate related threats including flooding fire and drought. In addition to climate resiliency, I will continue to work to improve the lives of women and families. This includes authoring legislation to remove dangerous chemicals from women's health products; increasing access to Paid Family Leave benefits; create new incentives to build affordable housing; and addressing increasing mental health issues among children and youth.

How do you plan to address regulatory challenges facing local businesses? What specific policies would you sponsor to streamline business regulations?

Promoting a functional regulatory environment is a priority and I took the opportunity to do just that by authoring Assembly Bill (AB) 1359, recently signed by the Governor into law. Under prior law, drilling exploratory wells for geothermal projects was treated as a separate project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), with the California Geologic Energy Management Division (CalGEM) designated as the lead agency. However, due to CalGEM's resource constraints, geothermal exploration projects faced multi-year delays. With the approval of AB 1359, project applicants can now request that counties in which projects are located act as the lead agencies for CEQA review. This change enables geothermal project developers to proceed efficiently, facilitating the exploration and development of geothermal resources essential for California's clean energy future.

Please provide a brief biography/summary of qualifications.

Assemblymember Marc Berman has served in the California State Assembly since 2016. A corporate lawyer by training, Berman served on the Palo Alto City Council from 2012 to 2016. Berman currently serves as the Chair of the Business & Professions Committee, one of the biggest and most influential committees in the Assembly, which oversees all entities that are regulated by the California Department of Consumer Affairs. Berman has one of the most prolific legislative track records of success in the legislature. This year the Governor signed all 17 bills Berman passed out of the legislature. Berman worked with business organizations, including the CA Chamber of Commerce and the CA Retailers Association, to pass first-in-the-nation laws to create a Retail Theft Restraining Order to crack down on retail theft across California, and to integrate Al literacy into our K-12 classrooms so the next generation of workers knows how to use Al both ethically and responsibly.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

My economic development vision for our area is not only to continue to nurture and support the thriving business community we have, but to create the broader ecosystem that our businesses need. One of the biggest concerns I hear from business owners is how hard it is to hire and retain talent. For decades we have been wildly successful at creating jobs, but have failed miserably at building the housing needed to provide a roof for all of the workers. That has led to a cost-of-living crisis in this region, and every level of government must do more to build more housing. Having an open-door policy and attending chamber events to develop relationships with business leaders across my district is a big priority of mine.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

I am proud that the vast majority of my bills, including many of my education and workforce development efforts, have received strong bipartisan support from colleagues who represent districts across California. I have developed strong personal relationships with many of my colleagues, including many Republicans, and seek out their input for my ideas. California is a huge, diverse state, with many different communities. It's important for me to understand how my legislative proposals impact every region of California, not just the Bay Area.

What are your top two policy priorities? What do you hope will be the impact of implementing these policies?

While I have passed legislation across many policy areas, two major priorities have been strengthening our democracy and ensuring that today's students get the skills they need to thrive in tomorrow's economy. On the education front, just a few of these efforts include expanding access to computer science education, media literacy, and AI literacy, as well as reducing barriers in higher education so students can get their degrees faster and get into the workforce. Regarding elections, I have written laws to create the Office of Elections Cybersecurity, create the Where's My Ballot tracking system, and make California a permanent vote-by-mail state, among many others.

How do you plan to address regulatory challenges facing local businesses? What specific policies would you sponsor to streamline business regulations?

This is a hard question to answer in 125 words, but at a high level I am always interested in learning about what barriers our local businesses are facing, and how I can help them thrive and succeed in our communities. Both of my parents owned and operated businesses in the area while I was growing up, one as an art gallery owner turned residential realtor and the other of a manufacturing plant, and I saw firsthand how outdated regulations could stifle productivity and expansion. As we enter the fall and begin considering legislation for next year, I am always open to suggestions from the business community about how we can remove unnecessary barriers at the state level that stifle their success.

My name is Lisa Gauthier. I have over 11 years of experience in city government, including as Mayor and vice Mayor, and I'm currently serving as a council member. I am also the Senior Vice President of Inclusion and Belonging at Silicon Valley Leadership Group. I pursued higher education in adulthood, earning a degree in Business Administration and Marketing Management, all while working full-time and fulfilling my mayoral duties. The urge to make a positive difference in my community and encouraging words from my daughter pushed me to run for the city council in 2012. I proudly belong to The Links Incorporated, Black Women Organized for Political Action (BWOPA), The National Coalition of 100 Black Women, and the Health Trust. I am also a founding member of One Shoreline and am an engaged board member of Live in Peace. I have staunchly advocated for affordable housing, ensuring everyone in East Palo Alto gets a fair chance. At the Silicon Valley Leadership Group, my primary objective is to pave the way for underserved communities, ensuring they have avenues for career growth, especially in leadership roles. If elected as Supervisor, my approach will be no different. I will advocate for and support policies that promote equal pay for equal work, ensure healthcare for everyone, and catalyze social equity.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

Despite a robust local economy, many of our residents struggle. Fortunately, our county is investing resources to provide opportunities to those struggling to have mobility. Last year, the Board of Supervisors appropriated funding to support free community college for local residents at our three campuses. This effort, led by our colleges, provides educational opportunities and aligns those opportunities with the needs of local employers. The County has also invested in trade programs with our local unions to help connect residents to training and apprenticeship programs. The County has also invested in our Renaissance Center, which provides material support for local residents' launches of businesses. These are the kinds of investments we must continue to make and expand.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

As an elected official, I have and will continue to focus on building solid and respectful relationships with my colleagues by seeking common ground on shared priorities. My approach will be collaborative, emphasizing open communication to understand different perspectives. I believe that trust and mutual respect are vital to achieving consensus, and I will work to foster those qualities in our interactions. By staying focused on the needs of our community and finding practical solutions that address our constituents' concerns, I will advocate for my ideas while being flexible and willing to compromise when necessary. My goal will always be to move our district forward to benefit everyone.

In your opinion, what are the two most important challenges facing San Mateo County, and how do you propose to address them?

In my opinion, the two most important challenges facing San Mateo County are access to affordable housing options for both low-income and middle-income families and public safety. To increase affordable housing, we must leverage modular building techniques to reduce construction costs, utilize public land for affordable housing developments, and revise zoning laws to allow for higher density in areas close to transit and amenities. For workforce support, I'd expand job training programs in collaboration with community colleges and industry leaders, focusing on emerging industries and local needs. Additionally, we should prioritize affordable housing initiatives and improve public transportation to ensure workers can live and commute within the county. Despite budgetary challenges, strategic public-private partnerships and federal grants can help finance these initiatives while fostering a strong local economy.

My involvement in the community, and serving on all three elected bodies in Belmont uniquely qualifies me to serve our community once again. I have a degree in Speech and Communication Studies. My career in the private sector has primarily been working for software companies. I am a focused, results-driven Customer Advocacy Program Director with 20 years of B2B software experience in leadership and a range of roles with an emphasis on project management, targeted plans, productive operations, and superior service. My management style is to lead by example, build consensus through listening and collaborating to successfully achieve common objectives. I want to leverage both my private sector and public sector experiences - all that I have learned in elected office - to help address many of the issues facing Belmont and the region.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

I am an architect by background. Part of my experience has been in traditional building design and construction roles. Other areas have included marketing, financial management, permitting, and federal government service as a federal procurement official. I have created and managed 4 companies as either CEO or CFO: 1 online retail and 3 professional services consulting and design firms. I have served on the Belmont city council since 2019. Before that I served on the Belmont planning commission and the Belmont finance commission. During my time in Belmont city government, we have modernized the city's general plan, greatly improved the city's financial reserves, and dramatically improved street pavement quality (the most frequent complaint expressed by residents). I am licensed as an architect in California and 5 other states. I hold the following degrees: MBA, BS. Engineering, B. Architecture.

What is your economic development vision for our area, and how will you engage with relevant stakeholders (i.e. Chamber members) to gather input?

We need to strengthen existing businesses while encouraging new, small businesses that can grow into global leaders. About every 25 years throughout recent history, the bay area has been home to a fundamentally new industry that has driven a whole new economic cycle. These new industries have usually started from technical innovations that quickly developed into global enterprises. In addition to being successful in their own right, these new companies have facilitated the created of numerous subcontractors and service providers, such as two of the companies I founded. We are ready for a new industry to lead a new business cycle. I will work vigorously with chamber leaders to facilitate this next business cycle while support existing businesses.

As a member of an elected body, how will you work with your colleagues to foster relationships and build consensus for your ideas?

This is something I have worked toward throughout my 12 years in Belmont city government. In "the bad old days" Belmont city council sometimes had a culture of dissention and argument for no discernible reason. Some members seemed to just want to argue for no reason. This was counterproductive and gave the city a bad reputation among individuals and companies that did business with the city. In more recent years, we have developed a culture of sticking to the issues and avoiding any personal recriminations. I will do everything possible to continue this culture of collaboration.

In your opinion, what are the two most important challenges facing Belmont, and how do you propose to address them?

The two most important are: approval of new biotech facilities and continued development of affordable housing. We have had 8 different biotech facilities proposed for different sites in Belmont. I have worked with city staff to expedite approval of these facilities wherever possible. These facilities will create numerous jobs and, hopefully, lead to new biotech innovations that will solve medical problems and initiate a new economic cycle. To staff the new companies located in these new facilities, we need affordable housing in reasonable proximity to the jobs. Belmont has made excellent progress on affordable housing, but we still have good sites available close to some of the proposed biotech facilities. I will continue working to develop those affordable housing sites.

What measures do you propose to recruit/retain businesses and to support our local workforce in Belmont, particularly given current budgetary challenges?

The continued development of affordable housing will help support the workforce. We have had excellent results developing affordable housing. More projects are under construction and still others are in the permitting pipeline. City budget challenges are not impacting affordable housing at this time. Our proposed revision of the business license tax (which is on the ballot this year) will encourage the development of new, small business by reducing the BLT on those small and start-up businesses. Larger and mid-sized businesses (such as my own) my pay a somewhat larger BLT, but the difference is not substantial. The larger BLT we will pay is still smaller than we would pay in some other cities.

The priorities should be about streamlining the permitting process, providing a high degree of certainty in the planning process (time and money), and prioritizing economic development amongst the council's strategic priorities. This will involve expanding public transit options, enhancing road safety, and improving parks and recreational spaces. By investing in resilient infrastructure, we can support our growing population and build a foundation for sustainable economic progress.

What measures do you propose to recruit/retain businesses and to support our local workforce in Redwood City, particularly given current budgetary challenges?

To recruit and retain businesses, I propose offering targeted incentives, such as streamlined permitting processes, tax credits for local hiring, and support for small businesses, including women and BIPOC-owned enterprises. Collaborating with the Chamber of Commerce, we can create business-friendly policies while promoting workforce development through job training programs, partnerships with local schools, and apprenticeship opportunities. Given current budget challenges, I will focus on optimizing resources by pursuing public-private partnerships, leveraging state and federal grants, and prioritizing investments that have long-term economic benefits. 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Please provide a brief biography/summary of qualifications.
